



**FIFTH REPORT:
POST-ELECTIONS INTERVENTIONS IN
GHANA SINCE 2009**

OCTOBER 2010

INTRODUCTION:

This is the fifth in the series of monthly reports planned to be issued by the CDD-Ghana and African Elections Project under the Post-Election Interventions project. The project is aimed at tracking and reporting on government's performance based on its manifesto and campaign promises.

The project assesses government's efforts to fulfill key policy commitments at national level as well as track the performance of two decentralized assemblies, the Tarkwa-Nsuaem Municipal Assembly, and the Accra Metropolitan Assembly on their 2010 plans of action.

The project team selected 10 thematic areas for the national tracking and 3 each for tracking developments in the selected assemblies. This fifth report is an update on development of the indicators in October 2010, and it covers the period between October 1 and November 30, 2010. 20 sub-indicators were developed under the 10 themes for the national tracking.

SUMMARY:

There were significant changes in the performance of indicators as measured for this fifth report. The findings from this report as compared to the one released in September shows much improvement in the performance of the indicators under review. Apart from the increase in the beneficiaries of the SFP (increased from 658,223 pupils to 673,089 (as given by the SFP secretariat) or 670,000 (as given by the Minister of Finance and Economic planning in the 2011 budget statement), there were also progress on other indicators including health, energy, and employment. However, the government is yet to tackle its promises on gender, corruption and decentralization

In all no indicator out of the total 20 sub-indicators being studied has successfully been completed. The government has started action on 16 of them and they are in the various stages of preparation and implementation. However, the government is yet to take

action on the remaining 4 sub-indicators as planned in the various development blueprints. (See table 'A' below for details)

The three themes picked under each of the 2 assemblies (Tarkwa-Nsuaem and AMA) were assessed under the project based on their Plans of Action for 2010. The Tarkwa-Nsuaem assembly did not make any progress in any of the 3 indicators (Education, Health and Gainful employment) selected for the study during this October/November monthly review.

The Accra Metropolitan Assembly could not continue its positive performance on its indicators as recorded in the September report. (See tables "B" and "C" below for more details).

COMMENTS: The Mills administration has stepped up its efforts in its agenda to attain certain campaign promises. The government claims it has replaced 640 schools under trees (as per the figures from the ministry of information) with classroom blocks and has awarded additional contracts which are expected to increase the number to 1000 by December 2010. (Source: Ministry of Information). However, the Minister of Finance and Economic Planning stated in the 2011 budget statement that 175 schools under trees have so far been replaced with classroom blocks while contracts have been awarded to build 165 new blocks. The figure as released by the Finance minister on Friday November 19, 2010 contradicts what has been trumpeted upon by the information ministry. The total figure of schools under trees in Ghana was given in the 2010 budget 5,227.

More youth continue to benefit from the Youth in ICT program. 22 youth completed their training in October and will be employed in the private sector. According to The Youth in ICT secretariat, jobs for the newly trained youth have already been secured and they will soon start. (Source: Secretariat, National Youth in ICT programme).

Community electrification project has started in so many communities and 253 communities have been supplied with electricity. (Source: Finance Minister, 2011 budget statement). Still on energy, the Finance Minister stated that the Bui dam which is planned to add 40 megawatts hydroelectric generator is 32% complete.

On Health, the National Health Insurance Authority (NHIA) is still waiting for the executive approval for the implementation of the one-time payment of Health Insurance Premium. However, Parliament has approved a loan agreement of Euros 10,900,000.00 between Ghana Government and KfW Frankfurt AM MAIN of Germany to procure 150 Ambulances and spare parts for the ministry of Health. As a preparation towards the arrival of the Ambulances, the National Ambulance Authority is training 210 recruits from 21 districts. The trainees are currently on attachment at their various districts and will return to complete the course around June 2011.

These efforts notwithstanding, the government is yet to take practical action on 4 remaining indicators as promised. Among them is payment of remuneration to district

assembly members, establishing Gender Units in all the 170 districts, enacting into law the freedom of information bill, establishing District Agricultural Advisory Services in the 170 districts, etc. (Refer to table 'A' above for more details) and also see briefs on all the 10 indicators below.

A. **Agriculture** : (1) Train 1,200 youth, and provide 7000 with inputs to cultivate 5,600 acres of land (source: 2009 budget pg. 65, bulletin 279)

(2) Establish District Agricultural Advisory Services (DAAS) in all the 170 districts (source: NDC Manifesto pg. 52)

Progress so far: 4 different streams were designed to achieve promise 1. They are The Block Farming, Fisheries, Livestock and Agribusiness. The National Youth in Agriculture secretariat has been able to roll out the block farming stream, has also finished the registration of interested youth and waiting for funds to be released so that they can roll out the remaining 3 streams.

No action yet on the second promise.

B. **Education:** (1) extend School Feeding Program (SFP) to all public primary schools (source: NDC Manifesto pg. 78)

(2) Replace all under tree schools with classroom blocks (source: 2010 budget pg. 42, bulletin 139-143)

Progress so far: the SFP is compiling list of total enrolment in this new academic year for planning towards achieving promise 1, and has therefore not added new beneficiary schools yet. However, number of existing beneficiaries pupils has increased from 658,223 to 673, 089 (per figures from SFP secretariat) or increased to 670,000 pupils (per 2011 budget as presented to parliament)

175 Schools under trees have been replaced with classroom blocks, and additional 165 have been awarded on contract (2011 budget). Note that figures from the ministry of information have 675 and includes both those completed and those under contract. Statistics from the 2010 budget has under trees

schools as follows: Kindergarten = 2,349; Primary Schools = 2,502 and JHS = 376 (TOTAL = 5,227) reference: 2010 budget pg. 42 bulletins 139-143

C. **Health:** (1) make NHIS one-stop payment (NDC Manifesto pg. 68; President State of the Nations Address)

(2) Establish Ambulance stations in all the 170 districts (2010 budget pg. 43 bulletin 148; 2009 budget pg. 171 bulletin 747)

Progress so far: on promise 1, the NHIA has submitted actuarial studies to the cabinet and waiting for approval to start the new policy. It was confirmed from the ministry of information, and added that the policy will start in first quarter of 2011

210 trainees recruited from 21 districts are currently on attachment at various district hospitals and will return to complete their training by June 2011 (source: National Ambulance Authority- NAA) Parliament has also approved a loan agreement of Euros 10,900,000.00, and government is expected to contribute Euros 1,500,000.00 for procurement of 150 Ambulances and spare parts. According to the Information Ministry, the fleet of Ambulance will eventually be increased to 350 countrywide.

D. **Energy:** (1) Increases electricity generation by 5000 mgws (Prez State of the Nations Address, and 2009 budget pg. 95 bulletin 419)

(2) Extend electricity to all communities with a population of over 500 (source: 2009 budget pg. 44, bulletin 176, point 4)

Progress so far: The West Africa Gas Project, the Bui dam project and public-private partnership projects such as the Asogri power project are all earmarked under this project. The Bui Dam project is 32% complete and expected to contribute 40mgws hydroelectric power generator (2011 budget)

On the second promise, 253 rural communities have been supplied with electricity (2011 budget). Our checks from the ministry of information for total

communities (with a population of over 500) under the project revealed that data collection is ongoing and the final figure is not known yet.

E. **Employment:** (1) Train high school graduates as trainees/trainers in ICT to train more unemployed youth in ICT (NDC Manifesto pg. 61)

(2) Open up avenues for unemployed people to assemble motorbikes, vehicles and agricultural implements (NDC Manifesto pg. 61)

Progress so far: 56 youth selected from the Greater Accra and the Volta regions were trained and deployed to the various district assemblies in the two regions. 22 youth were also trained and deployed in selected communities to train more school graduates. 30 youth who were trained upon request from some private companies completed training in October and will be employed in these companies.

On the promise 2, there is no action yet on the promises to open up avenues for vehicle and motorbike assembling plants. However, the Rural Enterprises Skills Project has provided training and startup capital for 4,252 rural apprentices in metal works auto-repairs, and electronics. Assin South, Garu Tempane and North Tongu Districts were also provided with Rural Technology Facility to manufacture simple machinery to support agro processing and small-scale industrial activities. The GRATIS Foundation also trained 300 technical apprentices in metal machining, welding and fabrication, foundry and wood work. The company manufactured 141 units of cassava and palm fruit processing equipment and developed new prototype machines for the local market. (2011 budget)

F. **Infrastructure:** (1) complete 38 uncompleted houses across the country for the Police Service (source: 2010 budget pg. 48, bulletin 162, point 1

(2) Construct Drainage Systems in the cities (source: 2009 budget pg. 110, bulletin 484 and 2010 budget pg. 30, bulletin 101)

Progress so far: the government is banging its hope on the STX Korea and Ghana government housing project to solve the police accommodation problem. The project has not started yet. Meanwhile the police service has been able to complete some of the uncompleted buildings in Sunyani, Takoradi, etc.

On the second promise, we are still struggling for current state of the project from the Hydrological department of the Ministry of Works and Housing (they have refused to cooperate with our data gathering staff since October, but we are still chasing them for the updates)

G. **Security and Safety:** (1) Build 50 pre-fabricated “Tent Houses” in heavy crime areas for the Police Service (2010 budget pg. 49, bulletin 162 point 3)

(2) Provide the service with the needed logistics for the service to function effectively to reduce crime “drastically” in the country (NDC Manifesto pg. 34 and 2010 budget pg. 48, bulletin 161)

Progress so far: The police administration from the beginning of the year started the project with their own resources, and with assistance by some communities who support the police to build the tent houses.

The government at the beginning of the year provided the service with vehicles and other logistics. The police Service is also one of the first beneficiaries of the Single Spine Salary Scheme. General crime rate was subsequently reduced from 20, 254 in January 2010 to 19, 753 in May 2010. (We are yet to receive the statistics on general crime rate for the third quarter of 2010).

H. **Gender:** (1) At least, women will get 40% representation in government and public service (NDC Manifesto pg 25)

(2) Establish Gender Units in all the 170 District Assemblies (Prez state of the Nations Address and 2010 budget pg. 36, bulletin 121)

Progress so far: Still not much achievement but there are efforts by the Ministry of Women and Children's Affairs to get more women into public offices targeting the upcoming District Assembly Elections through sensitization, capacity building and mentoring programs. The ministry through its women's desk selected 50 women from each of the 10 regions for the project.

The promise to establish Gender Units in the 170 districts is still outstanding

- I. **Corruption:** (1) Enact into Law the Freedom of Information Bill (NDC Manifesto pg. 24, Prez State of The Nations Address)

(2) Revise the Asset Declaration Law to make it more functional (NDC Manifesto pg. 24, Prez State of the Nations Address)

Progress so far: the bill is before Parliament for consideration

The promise on the asset declaration law review is before Cabinet

- J. **Decentralization:** (1) Re-demarcate Electoral Areas (NDC Manifesto pg. 29)

(2) Pay remuneration to assembly members (NDC Manifesto pg. 31)

Progress so far: 2 Legislative instruments (LI 1967, 2010) and Subsidiary Legislation (LI 1983, 2010) were passed by Parliament which empowered the EC to carry the intended re-demarcation exercise. Subsequently, the EC announced a reduction of the membership of the Unit Committee from 15 to 5 with all elected positions. Reduced the membership of the Urban, Zonal, Town and Area Councils from between 25-30 (for Urban Councils) and between 15-20 (for Zonal, Town and Area Councils) to a uniform number of between 15-20. The LI 1983 also determined the Electoral Areas as 6000 (increased from 5000)

No action yet on the second promise to pay remuneration to District Assembly Members.

COMMENTS: The two negative developments which affected the development plan on the AMA, as reported in our last update are yet to be solved (demolishing of the school fence wall and the broken down trucks). (Refer to table “B” above). The AMA is also yet to meet most of the promises made in its 2010 plan of action. The assembly is yet to provide students with free school uniforms, free text books, and furniture. The promise to build fence walls around the Ayalolo and Cable and Wireless schools is also outstanding. The plan to provide security lights in these same schools is also grounded after erection of light poles. The assembly has secured a refuse dump site but yet to start work on it.

Under waste and sanitation, there was no progress in this reporting period from what was reported in the last report. (Refer to table “B” above)
